

The Committee will also be working on improving our club regalia offer, establishing a business directory with member discount offers, and conducting a membership survey to gauge your opinion on how the club is travelling and where we should be headed.

Sydney Chapter

The Sydney Chapter has come a long way since July 2013 when it was formally recognised as a regional Chapter. Guy Coles has done a superb job as Convenor, with a focus on building the social foundations via monthly dinner meetings, coffee & lies, and a strong social media presence. These changes have not been without controversy, and there is still plenty of opportunity and

desire to improve. The next step is to establish a Sydney Chapter Committee so that tasks can be spread around and the job made so much easier. Several volunteers have already come forward to offer assistance with organising runs and Chapter regalia. Registration sheets

Every time you participate in a club run, it is a requirement that you complete the registration sheet with your name, member number, rego, and contact number. Why? For several reasons:

- It is a requirement of our CAMS permits which provide liability insurance for the protection of the club, our organisers and run leaders.
- 2. By signing the form, you are acknowledging the conditions of participation in the event.
- It gives you an opportunity to check your membership card to see if you are due for renewal – you must be a financial member to continue enjoying the benefits of club membership.
- If you get lost on a run, the run leader can call you and help return you to the group. Your rego number is useful for

- identifying who has gone missing.

 5. The registration sheets are used to allocate "Member of the Year" (MOTY) points which recognise our most active members. This is a prestigious club-wide award and there are also Chapter MOTY awards. Correctly recording your membership number makes this job easier.
- The MOTY data is analysed by the Committee to determine participation rates so that we can learn what events are popular and identify areas for improvement.
- 7. Participation levels are used by the Committee for pro rata allocation of funds to each chapter, to purchase thankyou gifts for our organisers, leaders, etc. We would be nowhere without our volunteers and this is a great way of ensuring that they feel appreciated.

At many of our social dinners, coffee & lies, etc, we have tended not to worry about registration sheets as they don't require a CAMS permit. However, several chapters log their attendance and factor it into their Chapter MOTY awards. For some members, these purely social events may be their only activity with the club. So in the interests of gaining a more accurate picture of club participation levels, you will begin to see simplified registration sheets appearing over the table.

After team photos, the ladies hit the track. First casualty was Kim Ranger who pushed the accelerator cable so hard that it broke and she had to retire with only 7 laps complete. Lesa Bunn pushed so hard that she decided it might be quicker to do the shortcut via the 4WD track and this didn't prove as effective a first thought. Meanwhile, RPM's Tammie Hotz casually cruised around the track and won the timed event by 2.492 seconds ahead of Sydney's Steph Katz.

Next on the circuit was the men's Race I and this was not going to be easy for any driver. Sydney's Adam Rumjahn muscled the kart around the track to set the best time for the day so far with an electric timeof 52.360 seconds and took race I by .191sec from yours truly.



Thanks to all the people who came from both near and far to attend this beautiful evening. I hope you all enjoyed it and will come on our next one.








Sandie's Secret Run

This was the first driver training event I helped organise. I was both nervous and excited about what lay ahead. All of us organisers were both happy and relieved to see that our efforts meant the day ran as smoothly as possible, while at the same time learning a few lessons on how to optimise for next time.

We awoke in a warm and sunny Goulburn on Sunday morning, along with a large amount of fog. Thankfully it cleared very early and the sun grew stronger. By the time we made the short trip from our motel in Goulburn down to Marulan it had cleared.

We got to the track bright and early, just after 7:00am (David Lawler still managed to beat us somehow!) and got the paperwork out of the way before the crowds arrived. Sure enough, the other 55 drivers began to turn up and we had a full carpark before long. The day saw lots of MX-5's, of course, and others including a Subaru BRZ and Toyota 86 GT which were of course very easy to distinguish on the track - a few from the Holden camp including an SS Commodore and Cruze, a 1981 Triumph TR7 and a Renault Megane RS, and even some nutjob in an old automatic Corolla (who happens to also be my husband).

We were fortunate to have II advisors including Lesa Bunn and Tammie Hotz. The feedback was excellent, especially having plenty of talented female drivers on hand to help with all the ladies in the first timers & beginners groups. from a females perspective. It's great to see so many women getting involved! So a big "thank you" to all the club

members who gave up their time to provide advice and hints about the fundamentals of driving on a track.

The first official event of the day was the track walk. |eff from MDTC spoke to the group about the correct corner approaches and turn in points, appropriate speeds and gears to be in for each corner, acceleration points along with some advice on how to drive through them and pointed out some key features of the course. David Lawler then gave a drivers briefing, addressing on-track behavior and some fundamentals of track driving etiquette for the first timers. Next, the run sheets were handed out, the beginner drivers started pairing off with advisors, and the first cars started making their way to the staging area.

Each group of 6 to 7 cars was worked out based on drivers previous track experience. The 10 minute sessions ran back to back to ensure minimal delays between groups and give drivers enough time to get into a rhythm for each session. Due to having nine groups - including three first timer groups - and some administrative delays causing a late start, each group only managed an average 4 runs on the track during the day.

By the next MDTD we expect that an extension on the track will be opened, allowing for more cars per group; between 9 to 10. In relation to the group numbers, this would mean we would have fewer groups for the next event. We would be looking at either 5 or 6. This will ensure more runs and overall time on the track for participants.

The overall feeling was positive and

that the longer sessions allowed an ample amount of time for each of the drivers to receive instruction from advisors and perfect or improve on their skills and techniques they had picked up during the day. The progress of the first timers was clearly visible as the day progressed. For people like me, watching from the sidelines the whole day, the improvement from everyone in the beginners and first timers groups was obvious by the end of the day and they are all to be commended.

A big thank you goes out to all of the advisors, Tammie Hotz, Lesa Bunn, Bryan Sheddan, Russell Maxwell, Stuart McFadyen, David Lawler, Luke Kovacic, Greg Bunn, Peter Feutrill, Steve Green and Glenn Thomas. They gave up their time to come out to Marulan and give the drivers some of their useful track knowledge and advice. We appreciated all of your help.

Also I like to thank the other organisers, David Lawler, Helen Green, Lindsay Green, Joshua Fitzgerald and Steve Fisher. They helped me to make this day possible and are just as much to be thanked.

There's plenty of ways to get involved and have fun with a huge variety of motorsport activities offered by the Club, catering to all experience levels.

Club Track Days

NSW MX-5 Club track days are recognised by many from within and outside the club as being well organized, enjoyable events. Our successful formula will continue with 6 track days scheduled for 2015. Club track days are conducted by our experienced, CAMS affiliated officials and offer a safe and friendly environment for beginners and novices. Track days are not races but timed sessions with plenty of track time to practice your skills and improve upon your PB. Ladies Only Sessions Grassroots motorsport is one of the few arenas where men and women can participate on an equal basis. However, whilst there has always been an interest, particularly in the Marulan Driver Training Days, some of our lady club members have been hesitant to make their motorsport debut. It prompted Gaynor Lawler to ask; "What if there was an all ladies group at Wakefield, would you have a go?" She got an overwhelming and ecstatic "YES!!!" Well ladies, your wish has been granted. Thanks to Gaynor, there is currently enough interest to run 2 dedicated ladies-only groups at the May 31 Club Track Day at Wakefield. The day will be supported by our experienced lady drivers who will provide guidance and advice on request for those making their Wakefield debut. NSW Supersprint Championship

Many club members will also be involved in the NSW Supersprint Championship. Open to all CAMS affiliated clubs in NSW, the Championship has a similar format to our Club Track days with timed sessions and regulated speed groups. Supersprinting offers the perfect forum for those wishing to experience a wide variety of track configurations and is a cost effective way to get more "seat time". This year, 37 club members competed at Supersprint events and they successfully won the club championship. Many club members also won their various categories in the championship.

There will be 7 Supersprint rounds in 2015 and we look forward to welcoming new drivers to our winning 2014 team as we defend the championship title. As a bonus, the National Supersprint Championship event will be held in NSW in 2015, giving participating club members the opportunity to win a national title. Strategic planning for the season will be underway soon and keen Supersprinters are invited to assist with team communications and championship registrations.

Motorkhanas

The 2014 Motorkhana was a great success, with many drivers finding out for the first time just how much fun they can have in an MX-5. A further 2 Motorkhanas have been scheduled for 2015. These events are a great opportunity to legally have a lot of fun in your daily-drive and are highly recommended to people who have never before really considered being exuberant in their driving. Motorkhanas are timed tests featuring one car at a time driving round a short course marked with witches-hats or flags at relatively low speed in 1st or 2nd gear. Conducted in a closed environment on a low grip surface such as watered concrete, Motorkhana requires no special car or driver equipment or preparation. The club will make available experienced drivers to ride in the passenger seat and provide advice during each run.

MX-5 Cup

The MX-5 Cup race series was inaugurated in 2014 and designed to minimise the cost and complexity of racing. The MX-5 Cup provides a safe, supportive and enjoyable environment for drivers to learn and develop their racing skills. In 2015, the series will expand to 7 rounds, spread across Wakefield Park and Sydney Motorsport Park South Circuit. One of these rounds will be designated a national event with MX-5 competitors from Queensland and Victoria attending. 
Driver Training Days at MDTC
