



Competition Report

JULY-AUGUST 2007.

The date for the following track day is Sunday the 4th November.

Club Track Days.

Since the last publication of Club Torque club track days have been in winter hibernation, however that is all about to change as I write. On the 16th and 17th September we have a double header at Wakefield Park with round 7 of the State Supersprint Championship on Sunday the 16th followed by our first club track day for competition year 2007/2008 on Monday the 17th. At the time of writing entries for the supersprint are a little thin where as entries for the club day are almost full.

Ladies Driver Training Day.

At the initiation of President Jean the club conducted a very successful Ladies only Basic Skills Driver Training Day at the Eastern Creek Skid Pan on Sunday 29th July. Fifteen club members and nine visitors participated. A very big thanks to Chief Instructor Val Stewart and her six trainers, Matilda Mravicic, Pat Rooke, Nick Martinenko, Chris Tonna, Bill Dougall and Ian Stewart. The day commenced with an informative talk from Val on driving attitudes followed by two-session of exercises on the skidpan. An enjoyable BBQ lunch broke the skidpan action.

How do we know the day was a success? Well you just had to look at the smiles on the ladies faces at the end of the day. The day also generated two new members plus a couple of entries for our September track day.

Supersprints.

Three rounds of the State Championship have been run in July and August; the rounds 4 and 5 were at Oran Park GP in July and round 6 was at Eastern Creek in early August. Matilda Mravicic is currently running second outright in the Championship, second in Type 4 and first in Class 4D. Ian Vickers and Stewart Temesvary are tied for second in Class 1B and tied for third in Type 1. Bradley Cecil leads Class 2B with yours truly in third with Matthew and Robert Guyder keeping us honest. Bradley is currently third in Type 2. Kevin Addison has not competed in the last two rounds but still holds fifth place in Class 3B. "Turbo Girl" Patricia Rooke, leads Class 3D and is fourth in Type 3 and Renny Roden is leading Class SVC.

The combination of these results sees the Mazda MX-5 Club in second place behind the New South Wales Road Racing Club in the Club point score. As mentioned above the club will be hosting the 7th round at Wakefield Park in September with the 8th and final round at Oran Park South on the 14th of October.

Racing.

During July and August we have had a one-hour race at Eastern Creek, rounds 4 and 5 of the State Race Championship, a Festival of Sports Cars Race Meeting at Oran Park Grand Prix and Chris Tonna ventured north to Queensland Raceway to run in the MX-5 races at the V8 Supercar meeting.

At the one-hour race Ed Chivers joined Chris Stannard in Chris' Porsche to finish 7th one place ahead of Lou lezzi and Anthony Robson in Lou's "SE". Val Stewart was 11th in her Mazda RX- 7, Tyrone Gautier was 15th ahead of the MX-5 Racing duo of Chris Gough and Joe Macare. Unfortunately Brian Anderson recorded a DNF completing only 40 minutes.

Entries in the two rounds of the State Race Championship have been very poor with only

fourteen starters at Oran Park and five at Wakefield Park. David Raddatz had mixed results at round 4 but was victorious at round 5 winning all 3 races finishing ahead of a Ferrari 360 Challenge and three Porsches.

The Festival of Sports Cars meeting at Oran Park was a great success. MX-5 races included Matilda Mravicic, Nick Martinenko, Chris Tonna, Lou lezzi, Chris Gough, Joe Macare and Arron Giltrow and Brian Ferrabee all the way down from Queensland. Brian Anderson swapped to the "dark side" and ran his 924S Porsche. Chris Tonna gave his new "SE" Nemo its first win in the wet race on Sunday afternoon.

Miss consistency Matilda finished second in all five races and Lou lezzi finished between third and fifth in his five races. Chris, Joe, Nick and Arron all flew the MX-5 flag with honour.

In the regularities Renny Roden, John Burgess, Dennis Brady and myself represented the club. I had a good weekend winning one regularity and finishing second in another two.

Up coming race meetings include round 6 of the State Race Championship at Eastern Creek on the 22nd and 23rd of September. The third Festival of Sports Cars race meeting at Wakefield Park is on the 20th and 21st of October, a one-hour Prod Sports race at Oran Park on 27th and 28th of October.

Don't forget the club's AGM on Wednesday 26th September at the Ryde Eastwood Leagues Club. Trophies for the 2006/2007 Competition Year will be distributed after the A G M.

RACING TO A DREAM

At a time when the news is full of negative stories about young drivers a local lad is proving them wrong

For year 11 Gloucester High School student Aaron Giltrow getting his driver's licence was not quite the same "big deal" as many of his peers.

While Aaron now has his L plates he found himself in the unique position of having to go through the process of becoming a qualified driver, but the past two years he has been driving race cars, often up to speeds of 180 kilometres per hour.



Aaron first got a taste for competition racing in go-karts seven years ago and as a kart driver he won two of the club championships and placed in the top 10 in two state championships.

Aaron said it was while driving karts he was noticed and offered the opportunity to get in a race car.

With the help of the NSW MX-5 Club, Aaron has been able to compete in Supersprints since the age of 14 and holds a CAMS competition licence. Aaron races in the production sport category which contains largely Mazda Mx-5's and the occasional Porsche.

"I started car racing when I just turned 15, two Christmas' ago, it's the best feeling, an adrenaline rush", he said.

Aaron turned 16 in March and recently competed in his first race. Despite being in a field of over 20 cars he managed to qualify sixth on the grid in his first attempt. Long time sponsor and supporter MX-5 Racing supplies the Mazda MX-5 race cars, which are capable of speeds in excess of 200 km/h.

Aaron is due to compete in the Festival of Sports Cars at Wakefield Park in Goulburn and the Production Sports Championship one-hour race at Oran Park in October. Aaron said these events often have talent scouts in the crowd, on the lookout for the next up and coming young driver. And he's hoping he will get noticed. Extract from the Gloucester Times

VAL'S ACHIEVEMENTS RECOGNIZED.

Val Stewart has always been a car fan. As a child, she says she was more likely to be found hanging out with her brother and his friends who were interested in cars, rather than doing those other typically "girlie "things. And she says she and her brother inherited their passion for cars from their father.

Stewart's most recent RX-7 addition was her second racing car, a 2000 model she imported from Japan. She competes in state championship events in NSW, Queensland and Victoria and of the 300 or so competitors; Stewart says there are usually only five female drivers at the most.

But that's not enough to put her off. "I've been doing it for about 12 years," she says." I should've been doing this 30 years ago.

There aren't many females, but the guys don't treat me any differently at all. Stewart says she enjoys the thrill and excitement of racing her RX-7s and gets a big "buzz out of it", especially when reaching speeds as high as 250km/h on the straight. Stewart would love to see Mazda make a new RX-7 because "Japanese cars have really come of age", she says. They're absolutely brilliant. The design and performance is very good."

And while the RX-7 is her true desire; she's also a fan of all Mazdas-including the MX-5 turbo that also shares the garage.

Camp Quality families love that feeling and family camps are

regularly held at Wombeyan and Jenolan Caves for that reason.

There are two camps held in each location every year and our old friends the MX-5 Club are hosting one and a half camps to Jenolan Caves with funds just banked.

The families arrive at Jenolan early on Saturday morning. They come in their own cars because they need to be able to go home if a child becomes unwell. A temperature can mean a life threatening infection so families are on the alert 24/7 for any sign that something is not quite right with their child's general health. They move into their accommodation at the caves with lovely family rooms in Mountain Lodge with a fridge for any medications and a TV for people who need a rest from their caving, bushwalking and partying.

Then it's off to explore, but in the process, with 60 CQ people on site, they meet other parents and kids who they have known at the hospital or have seen at the camp before. Importantly the old hands are always on the lookout for brand new families so they can make

them feel welcome and begin friendships that often become the mainstay in peer support networks that form spontaneously....this is what the family camps are all about....other than fun and enjoyment, that is.

There is so much beautiful scenery in such a short walk from Caves House and so much to see in the caves that the families are very active during their stay and the staff in the Rangers Office and at Caves House really took us under their wing and make everything very special and give every assistance to anyone who might need a hand.

Dinner on Saturday night is a magical Olde Worlde experience in the Grand Dining Room....the Chifley Room. The ceilings are so tall they are almost out of sight and the tables are set with crisp white cloths. There is a piano playing and the parents sit at tables with a glass of wine and a beautiful meal and the children have their own tables with their own food and everyone has a wonderful and memorable experience. After dinner there is a movie in the theatre and the big kids and dads play pool in the games room which is on the same floor as the restaurant and bar....some of the parents have a quiet drink in the bar and get to know others a bit better. Parents end up supporting other parents and because of these friendships, brothers and sisters of sick kids form friendships with other siblings going through the same stuff. Siblings have their own cross to bear. Their parents are preoccupied with a sick child and siblings often feel unloved, left out, frightened and alone and also guilty because they know it can't be helped...but they're only human after all. To find other kids in the same boat makes a difference. They're no longer the only child in the world who feels this stuff and without any discussion of their problems, just having someone who understands, helps them through.

Thank you MX-5 Club members for making all this possible...what you have really funded is the setting up of a whole group of peer support situations and a whole lot of great memories of a wonderful and magical experience in a place full of good energy....what you have promoted is optimism in the families and that is what gets them through....thank you again from all at Camp Quality.

The Brass Monkey Run

For those who don't know what the Brass Monkey Run is. Basically it is an annual run organized by The Austin Healey Owners Club . Other sports and classic car clubs are invited to attend.
