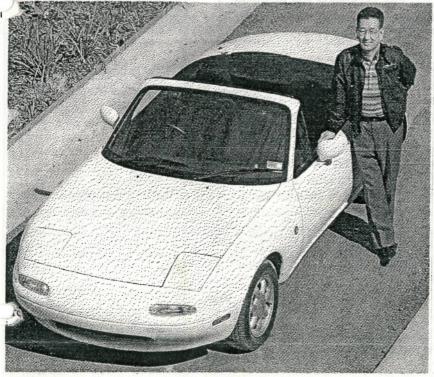

The Father of MX-5 moves of

oshihiko Hirai, the man who became a legend in the motor industry as the Product Program Manager of the MX-5 project, has left the Mazda Motor Corporation to take up a lecturing post at the Oita University in southern Japan.



Hirai, the Father of the MX-5: Toshihiko Hirai was the Mazda's "Shusa" or the Product Program Manager of the MX-5 Project. His standard Mazda business card was overprinted with the California, words: "A oneness between horse and rider".

Hirai. who graduated in March 1961, began his distinguished

career at Mazda, then Toyo Kogyo, in April of the same year. He worked in the Body Designing and Engineering Department, then spent two years as service manager in a dealership before returning to the Design Department and his first Project Leader job on the 626 series in 1978. While it was Tom Matano's team at

R&D Centre in Irvine, who actually came up

with the MX-5's front engine, rear drive, two configuration and design, it was Hirai who held overall position as "conductor" of the project.

"Wheels" magazine called him "Hirai Houdini, the genial genius",. Hirai had a well-known love with affair Australia and it is thought that he was the force behind the benchmark 250,000th MX-5 being built to Australian Design Rules.

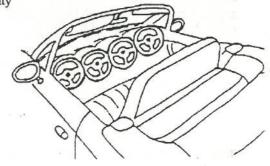
What's New in MX-5 Accessories

Did You Know?

One of the reasons your MX-5 handles so well is because of it's ingenius rear suspension design.

The rear suspension on the MX-5 is designed to turn the outside back wheel into the direction of a corner when placed under load. Developed initially for the RX-7, this helps the MX-5 track more accurately whencornering or changing lanes. The effect is similar to cars with four wheel steering, but without the weight penalty

heels magazine has once again conducted another giant handling test. This time, the magical MX-5 was up against far more superior purpose built machinery like the Porsche 968 CS, Godzilla GT-R, Honda NSX, Big Brother RX-7 and Mister 2. But when the smoke cleared and the points tallied the little roadster was still standing tall to machinery costing three to four times more. According to Dick Johnson the MX-5 came in third with the Porsche 968 CS first and RX-7 second.

The experts have decided once more the MX-5 is a great handler but needs a little more get up and go. Well help is not too far away, starting from a few hundred dollars, you can transform your little roadster to a real beastie with a little more poke. Here is a quick guide what's available in the aftermarket performance bits.

Turbo kits from BBR and AVO in Melbourne. I have seen the BBR kit fitted to one of our members cars and the finish and workmanship is superb. This will set you back about \$10K, the AVO stage 1 kit starts at \$4K plus installation, but don't forget the extra premiums on your insurance. The word "Turbo" to an insurance company is still a no no; especially an aftermarket one.

To avoid this problem many owners and members have opted for a more subtle approach. Performance Tuned Extractors, Mandrel bent high flow exhaust system were the starting point. Once again there are many different vendors selling these systems and each claiming to be the best. I have seen many installations and most have a problem of refitting the heat shield, I saw one car with the shield removed and it melted the air filter box! The best quality extractor I have seen were the Japanese made; Computer designed, chromed, mandrel bent RS*R extractors from Vision (located in Chatswood Ph: 4176322). Mated with the RS*R exhaust muffler it will set you back \$2450 fitted.

There are exhaust systems from AMG and Finishline for which the finish is not as good but is half the price. Power gains claimed by the

manufacturers range from 5kW to 10kW.

Next on the shopping list would be a new computer unit (ECU) or chip replacement. Powerchip was the first on the market and costs \$750. A complete modified, reprogrammed ECU is also available from Vision at a cost of \$1800. This is a complete and clean replacement of the entire computer and allows you to change back to the original ECU, unlike the Powerchip which requires your microprocessor to be removed and replaced with a daughterboard.

The standard air intake and filter box on the MX-5 as described by Iain Boyd in a previous newsletter said it all. But don't despair cos with about \$30 Dollars you can follow Iain's modification to get instant power boost. Even better still Finishline markets a RAM air box designed by Loch Stewart of the Oueensland Club for about \$400. HKS has a Powerflow air-filter kit, this eliminates also the factory box and provide a claimed increase in power of about 5% with a slight increase in induction noise, this goes for \$500. The HKS system differs in that it is still sucking in hot air from within the engine bay. To get the best of both worlds of cold air and high air flow, get a K&N Oil impregnated filter or the Racing Beat foam filter with the RAM air box.

To put all this new found power to good use, a limited slip diff is the go; Mazda has one as an accessory (surprise, surprise) at a cost of around \$2,000 fitted or you can get a Cusco (one way) limited slip diff. The Cusco limits differential action but only under power. Off throttle, the diff free runs and doesn't push or understeer influence the handling. The Cusco costs \$1300 plus fitting.

A stiffer and lowered suspension is next, Koni, Tokiko, GAB or Bilstein shocks are your choices with heavier sway bars lowered springs the essential mods. If you have an early model MX-5 a rear performance track bar is highly regarded and is available from Finishline.

If you thought the MX-5's gear shift was short Vision has C's short shift kit that greatly shortens the factory throw for more positive, and even faster gear changes and sells for \$430 fitted.

So there you have it a potpourri of performance enhancement bits you can start off small and build up to what ever you can afford. Ummm.....

I just can't wait for the V6 MX-5.

250,000th MX-5 A HIGHLIGHT OF NATIONAL CLUB CONFERENCE

hen Mazda Australia took almost 1,000 advance orders of the MX-5 before it's public release in October 1989, the company knew it had introduced a car which aroused great passion and enthusiasm.

It seemed logical to harness the enthusiasm MX-5 owners had for the little sports car and through the efforts of Mazda, MX-5 clubs were established in each of the mainland capital cities.

Earlier this month, coinciding with the display of the 250,000 MX-5 at the Melbourne Motor Show, Mazda brought togather the five MX-5 club presidents for the first national conference.

The MX-5 club presidents - Dr Peter Randell (WA), Mr Grant George (SA), Mr David Henry (Vic/Tas), Mrs Lea Findley (NSW/ ACT) and Mr David Verna (QLD) - were thrilled to be able to meet as a group and celebrate the arrival of 250,000th MX-5 which Mazda Motor Corporation built just three years and seven months after production of the model began.

Spokesman for the presidents, Mr David Henry said the arrival of the milestone car gave the clubs the perfect opportunity to get togather for a national conference - something that had been mooted for some time.

"One of our major priorities was to

organise a national meeting of MX-5 club members each year and this will commence with the first "National Meet" to be held in South Australia during Easter 1993," Mr Henry said.

"Other significant the mooves were appointment of MX-5 club national committee and implementing plans to produce an annual National Year Book."

Mr Henry said he was extremely pleased with the outcome of the conference and added that all MX-5 Clubs would benefit from the formation of a national committee.

With more than 3,000 Mazda MX-5s sold in Australia since October 1989 the MX-5 clubs in

each state have enjoyed on-going membership growth.

The MX-5 Club of Victoria - the first of the clubs to form - was the largest inaugural membership club registered with the Confederation of Australian Motor Sport (CAMS).

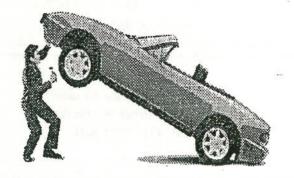
