
We are also continuing our "Tech" nights this year. Our popular Pittwater run is on again. There will be a Trivia night, and a Drag Racing night.

Mike's Competition Report

Here we are in January and the start of another exciting new year with the MX-5 Club. I hope that you all enjoyed Christmas and the Festive Season and that 2003 will be a prosperous, enjoyable and safe year. The club has plenty of exciting events lined up for 2003 and for those with a leaning towards the competitive side of MX-5 motoring then we will endeavour to satisfy your appetites.

Our first club Practice Day for 2003 is to be held at Wakefield Park on Monday the 10th February. We look forward to seeing the familiar faces and hopefully a few new faces at this event. If you have not been to a Club Practice Day before come along and join in the fun. Experienced competition licence holders from within the club will coach club members who have not experienced the thrill of driving on a racetrack. Entry Forms, Helpful Hints and Supplementary Regulations can be obtained from the club's web site. Other club track days will be held at Wakefield Park on Sunday 30th March and Monday 26th May to complete the 2002/2003competition year. On Saturday the 12th of April we intend to conduct a driver training day similar to the one held in February last year which was a great success. We will need to have a minimum of twenty starters to make the day viable so if you are interested please contact me or keep your eye out for the registration forms in Club Events.



On the open competition side the club will be conducting a round of this years State Supersprint Championship in conjunction with the Z Car Club. The date applied for is Sunday 22nd of June, with Wakefield Park being the venue. This will be an opportunity for our club to put a little back into the sport that we enjoy and have been successful in during the past four or five years. Planning and organization of the event is well down the track. What we will need to successfully conduct the day is volunteer officials, scrutineers, timers, grid marshals, flag marshals etc. Please put the date in your diary and advise me or Zan

Menzel of your willingness to assist. For those wishing to compete in this years Supersprint Championship then I can advise that Championship Entry Forms are available from Sandra at the CAMS State Office, Telephone 9635 1366. Cost of entry is \$50.00 and you will need a CAMS L2S licence, I can provide you with a licence application form. The MX-5 Club are the current State Champions following our win in 2002, our third win in the last four years. So if you want to be part of a winning team, sign up for 2003. For more information then don't hesitate to give me a call. For those that want to be a little more serious and join the guys and gals that go Prod Sports Racing then I suggest you call Ed Chivers on 0418 573 891 who can provide you with all the details. It would be remiss of me not to mention the success recorded by the club and its members in open competition in 2002. Firstly in the Production Sports Car Championships Zane Al-said and Ed Chivers competed in most rounds of the CAMS Championship conducted over six rounds and the PSCRAA Championship conducted over eight rounds. The Championship rounds were conducted at Eastern Creek, Oran Park and Wakefield Park racetracks here in NSW plus one round at Winton in NE Victoria. In the CAMS Championship Zane recorded an excellent 3rd overall on 164 points to the winner's 183 points. Ed Chivers who missed one round was fourth on 125 points. The cars that finished first and second ahead of Zane and Ed were both Porsches. In the PSCRAA Championship, Zane was fourth outright and second in class C whilst Ed was sixth outright and third in class C. Congratulations Zane and Ed on a great result. Other club members who competed at selected rounds and acquitted themselves well included, Lou Iezzi, David Raddatz, Matilda Mravicic, Nick Martinenko and Val Stewart. As mentioned earlier Teamx5 were successful in regaining the Southern Sporting Car Club Shield after accumulating 120 points in the Club Championship during the 2002 Supersprint Championship. In second place was the New South Wales Road Racing Club on 96 points with the defending champions Toyosports third on 71 points. The Championship was conducted over eight rounds at Eastern Creek, Oran Park, both the South and GP circuits and Wakefield Park. Class success recorded were in class 1a, Robin Thomson first with 60 points and Peter Cooper second on 33 points. In class 1b Mike Hicks first on 72

points with Phil Barlow third on 20 points. Steve Lamont won class 2a on 36 points whilst in class 3c Matilda Mravicic won with a total of 61 points, second was Nick Martinenko on 52 points with Lindsay Burke third in his trusty Mazda 808 on 25 points. Other club members to run one or two rounds included David Raddatz, Bill Dougall and Derek Plante. Congratulations to all on a great overall result and some fine individual efforts.



For 2003 we need to win the Club championship for the fourth time thus becoming the first club to win the shield on more than three occasions. Since writing the Competition Report for the "spring" edition of Club Talk there have been three successful club track days at Wakefield Park. Two Mondays, the 14th October and 9th December and one Sunday the 10th November. All days have been well supported with between thirty-five and forty-five starters. At the October meeting Matilda Mravicic recorded fastest time of the day in a time of 1.12.05. The eight-lap regularity winner was Steve Lamont with a time variation of 1.12 seconds. The November meeting included entries from members of the Clubman Association and the MG Car Club in Canberra. Darryl Sheather in his PRB Clubman in 1.08.81 recorded fastest time of the day. Fastest club member was Barry Faux in his recently acquired 200 SX Nissan whilst fastest MX-5 was Bill Dougall in "Bugger" and Val Stewart recording the fastest time for a lady in her Mazda RX 7. Chris Tonna won the regularity with a time variation of 3.83 seconds. At the December meeting fastest time of the day was recorded by Jason Hay in his indecently quick road going MX-5 with a time of 1.09.79 whilst Matilda Mravicic won back her fastest lady crown. Bill Dougall in "Bugger" won the regularity with a time variation of 2.70 seconds. After the first four rounds of the season. 2002/2003-competition progressive point scores and fastest lap tables are shown at the end of this report. Look forward to seeing you at Wakefield Park on the 10th February, have fun and drive safely.

Rear Fog Lights

The Lighthouse of the Road

Why rear Fog Lights? (Hint: It ain't eye candy)

You may have seen my first article 'Friggin' with the Fog Lights' published in Summer Club Talk 2002 edition.

That was inspired by the Mazda MX-5 Model designated 'NB8B' introduced to Australia coming standard with front Fog Lights. It related to the law, the hows and whys of using them, light refraction physics and courtesies to other drivers.

Travelling to London and Paris last year, I noticed the MX-5 NB8B (current) model over there indeed had the rear Fog Lights fitted in a far more integrated way than the NA (pop up headlight) model range, that simply had a square light cut into the rear bumper bar and angled for maximum safety and effect.

Completing the Fog Light package in countries suffering far more frequent Fog attacks than us, the European MX-5's have the 'near side' (meaning 'near the kerb', whether left or right hand drive) reversing light remains, replacing the off side (drivers side) reversing light with a Rear Fog Light. This is unavailable here.

Why one, not two? As with Mercedes-Benz and Volkswagen, one is lighter, simpler, less expensive to produce & fit. It drains less power being used, which is not insignificant, and – it discourages 'aesthetic usage', i.e., turning them on because "they look good...".

When I've asked folk why they have their rear fog lights on, on a clear, dark night with no fog, I have been told 'because they look good'. Lucky I wasn't a cop, because after booking them for having their rear Fog Lights on without fog, I'd then have combed over their car looking for defaults, due to the poor excuse!

Fog Lights are an essential safety device – when there's Fog.

Think of a Lighthouse for ships, on a rough shore (South Head, Sydney Harbour for instance), in nasty weather. A beacon for danger.

Now think of a Rear Fog Light on a slow travelling vehicle, in fog, in a 110km/h zone. Hmm, you see the link. That's what they're for. Not eye candy at all. Using them without fog is like the Police using Tear Gas when there's no riot – utterly useless, unnecessary and anti-social.



Anti-social? That's a bit rough isn't it Biggles? No, and I'll tell you why. I'll give you an example; I sat upon the Bradfield Hwy, swinging over the Harbour, for half an hour on one occasion. I'd just passed the toll booths, and the traffic stopped dead – an accident. Since inserting the Bus Lane, folk who know that spot know that you have just one lane. One lane, and no escape. You cannot turn around. You cannot get over the fence on either side. You're stuck there on the Harbour Bridge, if the car in front fails to proceed.

I was in the MX-5 (Moz) behind a Pajero – with rear Fog Lights on. (We all know what *Pajero* means in Spanish – this may well be why). This means my head height was at exactly that of this 4WD's tail light cluster. Fantastic. Not! The Pajero's Fogs are particularly large and bright – brilliant in thick fog, on a motorway, when the Pajero is crawling at 20km/h and the MX-5 is zooming up behind it a lot quicker, perhaps: Warning, MX -5!! Pajero ahead!!

His Fog Lights were so bright and piercing, the effects of his brake lights (much lesser intensity by design) were such that I hardly noticed them come on & off when we started moving again.

Fog is thick moisture vapours. This disperses light, thus blanketing them from a distance. You'll remember in the 'Friggin' with the Fog Lights' article, I mentioned how it reflects headlights light back into the driver's eyes – that means it's no longer going forward – it cannot get through the moisture vapour very well. At all.

Hence, the problem with seeing each other at night, in fog.

Rear Fogs are effectively a 'high beam' light, only coloured red. This is to pierce through the fog vapours as strongly as possible, sending a warning signal to others behind then. Reflection not being an issue as with front Fog Lights, looking in your rear view mirror shows a vast, red ball of light - reflection back to the car from behind. This is critical on high speed roads - F2 to Wollongong, M5 to Canberra, M4 up to Katoomba - and European motorways, Autobahns and high altitude US Interstates, where many dozens of cars can pile up from one burst of Fog.

Different drivers, in different vehicles with different skill sets and confidence levels - can travel at dramatically different speeds of Motorways, when a highly variable whiff of Fog blows over the road from total white out, to a wisp - in just a few meters. Some slam their brakes on - others blow straight through. Most slow down. Slow down by.... how much? That's the point. Bad visibility, and all of a sudden, everyone's travelling at different speeds.

Enter, the Rear Fog Light. They are compulsory in Korea, as the entire country is mountainous; Hence, every Hyundai and Kia is now blazing away on a Saturday night, in Sydney... (Continued on page 11)

So, back to dear old Mr Pajero, Fog Lights ablaze on a crystal clear, dark, moonless night, with me stuck behind him. I felt like my face was being mashed into his rear light cluster. Head ache arriving, what do I do? Put my sunglasses on? Why does this *Pajero* have his friggin' Rear Fog Lights on??

My top 5 guesses:

- #5. He/she has *no idea* what they are for
- #4. They've seen other 'Pajero's' (in many other makes ;-)) with *theirs* on with no fog why not me too?
- #3. I've paid for them, I'm gonna use 'em.
- #2. Attention seeking device; "Have you *noticed me* in my nice *new* Pajero yet?" (This would be sadly subconscious, methinks.) But the winner is....
- #1. "I think they look good".

This is the *worst* of all reasons, and is the toss away excuse used for folk *really* turning on the rear Fogs for all the other reasons, listed above.

On a dark, moonless night, would you shine a torch into a friends eyes? No. You'd find other ways to gain attention. Like, wit. Or taking your clothes off. Or something.

When you see a car coming the other way at night, do you flick your high beam lights on, and leave them on? No. It's silly, moronic and dangerous, which is why it's illegal.

Like having your rear Fog Lights on, with no Fog.

So please – it's not cool. It doesn't gain you attention for the right reasons. It doesn't even look good. Don't render your brake lights less effective. It's illegal, and with very good reason. Save 'em for the Fog.

Cowra Weekend

We had a great time. And at a huge cost of \$77 a night for dinner, bed and breakfast, this was one weekend that definitely did not break the bank. (Pity about all that wine we bought....oh well.)

On Saturday we drove via Bathurst. Did a couple of circuits around the track. Craig was sideways at one stage. Couldn't believe how steep the road is. And it is a public road, with driveways leading off it!



We stopped at the Japanese Gardens in Cowra before going to the Motel. The design of the gardens was testament to a huge amount of planning. 

general.

Well, we didn't need Sherlock to tell us that did we. No surprises here. but the smallest blemish upset terribly; All that Meguiar's, covers and garaging - then someone leans on our baby...



Greg has been performing 'paintless dent removal' panel beating for 12 years and showed me the hand made tools – made by himself – which he uses to caress and massage panels back to perfection. Or near perfection, dependant upon the above criteria.

Which is what he did, in removing my permanent palm mark from the black, and utterly unforgiving finish on our MX-5.

Many thanks to Greg for the great job in restoring our baby, and the interesting education for me as well.

The MX-5 is known to have both soft paint and soft panels, both just the way cars are made these days. The former is due to the water based environmentally friendly paints modern manufacturers use. The latter, well; it just is!

Did you know that you do not necessarily need the full traditional panel beating (being panel filler and painting) to have small dings repaired?

During a fast wheel rotation at Wakefield last winter, I unthinkingly leant on the mudguard to stand up: The heel of my hand dented the curved, black panel. I've been staring at it with chagrin ever since!

'Round bottomed' dents such as this, and hail dents can be literally massaged out, if there's rear access, and the bottom of the dent does not form a 'V' shape, or crease, by fella's like Greg Aghayan of J.S. Craig Panel Beaters in Artarmon.

My dent would have cost \$120 to have fixed, but Greg only charged me \$100, as he will now do so for you, too. He needs to see the dent to quote it, initially.
