I like to talk and I truly love my phone. Much to the annoyance of my people; it is by my side at all times. Except in the car. Because whilst my phone is my doctor, my accountant, my personal assistant and my significant other, when I'm driving – it stays in the boot. You see for me, car time is Me Time and, by it's very existence, my phone is a constant reminder that I could and should be doing other things.

I used to travel with my phone in an approved cradle and even if I never answered it's call, I was still being bombarded with messages such as;

"Mum, it's an emergency. I can't find my zombie contact lenses. CALL ME BACK."

And, "Um Mel, is the cat meant to be that colour?" (It was St Patrick's Day so; yes.)*

Such distractions were that last thing I wanted when flying along the M5, dodging fully laden B-Doubles and an untethered and clearly second hand couch that clung to the middle lane and fired off beige corduroy cushions at regular intervals. (It is out of character for me to be frightened of a pillow but corduroy was not built to travel at 100kms/h and those things impacted the road in an explosion of bad taste and feathers; leaving me with zero visibility and traumatic 1970's flashbacks.)

Traffic incidents caused by mobile phone distraction have been on the increase and in response, the Roads and Maritime Authority recently issued a raft of changes to the traffic laws to discourage (and in the case of L and P plate drivers - prohibit) mobile phone use whilst driving or riding. From January 22, 2016 it is illegal to touch or handle your phone in any way, including having it in your lap or cradling it between your shoulder and ear. You may not e-mail, use social media, take photos or hold your phone in any way even when your car is stopped in traffic (you must be parked). You can still make or receive calls, play music or use navigation services but only when the phone is in a cradle with Bluetooth or voice activation.

L and P plate drivers are not permitted to use their phones at all when driving or riding. From now on, mobile phone offences will be included in double demerit periods with increased penalties from 3 to 4 demerit points. For L and P plate drivers, this would exceed their demerit point threshold and result in a 3 month licence suspension.

So now there are many more reasons to keep that phone at arm's length and only for emergencies. All the better to concentrate on the drive and enjoy that Me Time.

THE MOTY POINTS SYSTEM

Member of the Year (MOTY) points are aimed at acknowledging and further encouraging member involvement in Club activities. The MOTY Award goes to the member with the highest number of MOTY points accumulated during a full membership year - 1st November to 31st October. New MOTY points are accrued during the first full award year after joining the Club.

There are many ways to accrue MOTY points including:

Organising a Club event - 6 per day Assisting to run a Club event - 3 per day Organising a recurring Club social event 2 per day

Participating in a Club event - 2 per day Attending the AGM - 3

Official at Club track event - full day (eg. flag marshall, grid marshall) - 4
Official at Club track event - partial day (eg. scrutineer) - 2

Writing an article published in Club Torque or on Website - 4 Providing photos published in Club Torque or on Website - 4

NOTES:

- 1. The "per day" points allocation is capped at a maximum of 5 days.
- 2.Recurring Club social events include monthly dinner meetings and coffee gatherings.
- 3.A member attending/organising an event who also writes an article and/or provides photographs of the event published in Club Torque or on Website earns accumulated points.
- 4.Track events include club track days, MX-5 Cup rounds, CAMS Supersprint rounds, Nulon Nationals, Philip Island 6-hour, Driver Training Days, Motorkhana and Drift Days. 5."Organising a Club event" includes Event Secretary and Clerk of Course at Club track events

Committee members and former recipients are ineligible for the MOTY Awards and are not included on the points table. See the Membership page on our website for more details.

Would any Chapters stoop to cheating to win?













Shoalhaven River Cruise



The display vehicles change over time, with the current collection boasting a Group A Ford Sierra Cosworth from the British Touring Car Championship, a very pretty little (original) Mini Cooper, a Fiat 500 Abarth from a recent Bathurst 12 Hour campaign and an open wheeler in McLaren-esque livery from Mika Hakkinen era; though as it was not moving it was easy to mistake for a 2015 McLaren-Honda! Trackside is easy to access on the corner of Manns Road and Central Coast Highway, and the surrounding large shopping precinct means parking of a night-time is easy.

After a fantastic meal and a few tall tales it was time for the run home, taking in some more MX-5 friendly roads. A quick left at Narara put us on to Mangrove Road and a great uphill blast toward Strickland State Forest. After crossing the M1 Motorway at the top of "Ourimbah Hill" we turned right on to Dog Trap Road for the downhill mogul-run in to the back of Ourimbah. From here we followed the old Pacific Highway through Kangy Angy to Tuggerah, then Old Maitland Rd, Hue Hue Rd and Wyee Rd to Morisset. The cooler air and the darkness provided the perfect setting for a short but enjoyable drive.

"Kermit", a 1998 NB, recently demanded a speaker upgrade. Some JL Audio C5650X 6 inch Coaxial Speakers from Soundmaster if you please. And for owner Warren Lewington (aka Mr Magoo) - what Kermit wants, Kermit gets.



Removing MX-5 door trims comes with the old "screw hidden under the armrest carpet trick." That solved, the auto electricians tricky-plug on-the-tweeter curse was experienced. Kermit unceremoniously dummy-spat the old tweeters from the door trims, and the door-mounted speakers.




I re-used the OEM tweeter plugs and some of the original looms. I soldered standard speaker wire (monster cable is unnecessary) from the OEM door speaker feeds, and soldered the new door speaker connections. I created neat looms to the splitter boxes, and checked the new looms wouldn't foul window movement



The old door speakers were carefully divested of their mounting blocks with a chisel. The tweeters original brackets were kept.



Door holes? They were already there! Thanks MAZDA engineers. Then there was splitter unit bracketry.



Mounting the new tweeters onto the original brackets. I used gasket silicone - crude - but effective on several counts: it sticks stickily, has high frequency vibration absorption effect (crucial to speakers), mounts compactly, and, well; it was all I had available.



I developed a cunning plan: Bunnings® aluminium, cut, drilled and bent with g-clamps on my makeshift bench. Oh Magoo, you've done it again!



The door speaker mounts required Dremel® surgery and my late Dad's tin-snip and tucks. The new door speakers screwed perfectly into the surgically corrected mounts, which thereto properly screwed the doors.



It was appropriate these awesome speakers first played Supertramp's "Take the Long Way Home" – which was where Kermit's next hop, skip and jump took us!
